WHAT TAJE DOES:

- Provides outreach, mentorship and workshops to all areas of the state by supporting regional representatives elected by members in their respective regions. Private schools have their own representative.
- Supports New Voices of Texas, a youth-led advocacy movement consisting of student leaders organized to enact legislation to challenge the consequences of the 1988 Hazelwood v. Kuhlmeier Supreme Court decision.
- Provides members with experiences and info for developing successful teaching of journalism and directing of publications by hosting its annual Fall Fiesta convention.
- Provides information at taje.org on social media and in state and regional workshops on new developments, trends, practices and standards to raise the quality of student-produced media.
- Works with the Texas Education Agency and the State Board of Education to establish professional criteria for journalism education.
- Supports and works closely with other scholastic journalism organizations by sharing information and collecting membership dues for:

WHO TAJE HONORS:

- *Administrator of the Year Award* honors campus/district leadership who supports the journalism education experience.
- *Texas Journalist of the Year* honors a graduating senior for their work on publications throughout their academic career. The winner and runners-up are recognized at the ILPC Spring Awards Ceremony.
- *Pathfinder Award* honors journalism educators with seven years (or fewer) experience.
- *Trailblazer Award* honors educators who set trends and shape Texas journalism.
- *Friend of Journalism Award* honors efforts to expand the scope and capability of Texas scholastic journalism.
- *Texas Treasure* honors individuals who spent their careers in Texas journalism and helped, advised, guided and directed other journalism teachers in the state.

HOW WE PAY IT FORWARD:

- \$1,500 Bill Taylor Memorial Scholarship for the Texas Journalist of the Year. The Texas JOY is entered in the Journalism Education Association's national competition.
- \$1,000 scholarships awarded to four graduating seniors
- Six \$150 summer workshop scholarships for students
- Three \$250 summer workshop scholarships for teachers
- Scholarships for students to attend Fall Fiesta

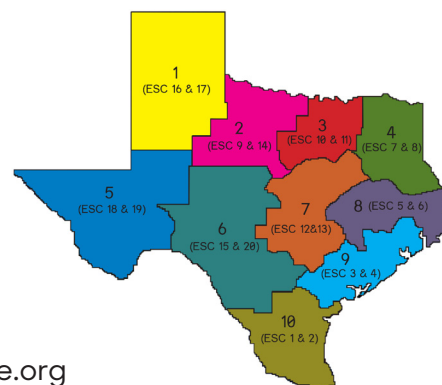
